Denbighshire Music Co-operative (DMC) provides peripatetic music to 75 schools with a team of 55 self-employed teacher members. DMC also employs 2 full time staff, 3-part time staff and covers 4500 pupils a week with specialist music lessons in schools.



Torfaen Leisure Trust (TLT) manages five leisure facilities in Torfaen, serving a population of 90,000. TLT commenced trading in 2013 and describes itself as a dynamic, single-focused organisation, passionate about promoting healthier lifestyles through "FUN" activities.



Run 4 Wales is a social enterprise which delivers mass participation sporting events in Wales. Its core event has been the Cardiff Half Marathon, which has been supplemented in 2016 by a number of international running and cycling events.

Cycle Training Wales promotes cycling as a means of transport and recreational activity through the provision of educational activities, training services and refurbished bicycles. It currently delivers National Standard school cycle training, adult cycle training and a wide range of bicycle maintenance courses.



The Fern Partnership is a charity linked to Ferndale Community School. Its objectives are to advance the education of the pupils of Ferndale Community School and enhance the Health and Wellbeing of local people and the wider community.



Wales Restorative Approaches Partnership works with offenders, their families and the communities to break the cycle of re-offending. It provides training and consultancy services to a range of organisations such as local councils, police and probation services, housing associations and community organisations.



Full Circle Education provides services to schools, youth and community settings to improve youth well-being. Its youth projects, training, events and curriculum resources aim to connect children and young people with their limitless potential, by challenging the barriers faced to school attendance, attainment and aspirations.

Awel Aman Tawe has established two separate environmental co-operatives - Egni has installed solar panels on 5 community buildings, the first solar co-op in Wales, whilst Awel is currently building a 4.7MW wind farm.



Dulas is a small co-operative based in Machynlleth, which delivers renewable energy solutions to businesses, landowners and charities. From hydro dams in Austria to solar powered vaccine fridges in Zambia, Dulas innovates the technology required and delivers it.



Greenstream Flooring takes otherwise 'wasted' carpet tiles and, via the engagement of long-term unemployed placements and volunteer opportunities, converts them into re-usable carpets, many of which support low income social housing tenants unable to otherwise afford the basic warmth, comfort, and dignity that carpets provide.

Bangor Gymnastics offers high quality gymnastics training to children and young people in North West Wales. It has 480 members and offers gymnastics activities to the local community in an inclusive and bilingual manner, regardless of age, gender or disability.



Market Hall Cinema is Wales' oldest cinema and the only remaining cinema in Blaenau Gwent. In 2013 it was taken over by the local community with a simple business proposition - to sell 'seats and sweets'. It invests its profit into upgrading the building and community activities such as dance classes, painting courses, music workshops and film making courses.



Too Good to Waste operates a furniture & electrical re-use business in the heart of the South Wales valleys. It offers a free service collecting items of preowned, re-usable furniture, electrical & household items from residential homes and businesses, and distributes these through its showrooms in Ynyshir and Aberdare.
