Growers face record temperatures in Morrocco

On August 11th, for the first time in history, the temperature in Morocco has exceeded 50.4 degrees Celsius, in the Souss Massa region where a large part of the country's tomato, early vegetable, red fruit, stone fruit, and seasonal fruit production is located. Growers anticipate a shortage of seeds and delays to the early season, potentially raising demand for this produce with our large-scale retailers. See the article on 'Hortidaily' here

Our webinar on increasing biodiversity on horticultural sites

On the 07th August we hosted an excellent webinar of best-practice for biodiversity, led by expert ecologist Barry Stewart from www.celticwildflowers.co.uk. Topics included: supporting pollinators and pest-controlling insects; 'boosting' flowers and seeds in farmed areas; the importance of field boundaries, 'green corridors', wet features and managing 10% of a site as a range of wildlife habitats. Gethin Davies from the RSPB also introduced the Farm Wildlife Partnership who aim to work with growers and businesses.

Focus on ... Horticultural tourism

Harvesting Lavender

Lavender is a great crop for wildlife and **horticultural tourism**. It can be harvested July – August. Flowers are best cut when the plants are dry, and strong sun will improve the oil content. For dried flowers, cut just before the flowers reach full bloom, lay in open trays and dry in the sun (covered at night) or in a ventilated, dry room. For more info see here.
