UNDERSTANDING APPRENTICESHIPS IN WALES

Levels

There are different levels of apprenticeships to suit your business needs.

These range from foundation level (equivalent to 5 GCSEs), Apprenticeships (equivalent to A level qualifications), Higher Apprenticeships (equivalent to foundation degrees) and Degree Apprenticeships (run in partnership with universities).

Apprenticeship Level	
Foundation Apprenticeship Level 2	Foundation Apprentices study towards qualifications equivalent to 5 GCSEs or NVQ Level 2, and the route includes a practical work element that helps learners gain valuable on-the-job experience. Many go on to complete Apprenticeships and Higher Apprenticeships.
Apprenticeship Level 3	Apprentices gain valuable on-the-job skills whilst studying towards a nationally recognised qualification equivalent to 5 GCSEs (at A*-C), 2 A-Levels or an NVQ Level 3.
Higher Apprenticeship Level 4/5	Higher Apprentices work towards qualifications equivalent to a HND, HNC, or Foundation Degree, and the route includes a substantial work-based learning component that allows apprentices to apply their skills in real-world settings while gaining valuable industry experience.
Degree Apprenticeship Level 6	By combining higher level learning and employment, employers can develop their workforce, and apprentices can gain a degree at the same time as building their careers and earning a salary.

Welsh Language and Additional Needs

Welsh Language and Bilingual Apprenticeships

Apprenticeships in Wales can be studied in English or Welsh, or even bilingually, depending on the employer's needs. There are business benefits to employers who use the Welsh language and providing a Welsh service to Welsh speakers can improve customer service.

Hiring apprentices with additional needs

Encouraging applications from disabled people and people with additional needs is good for business. It can help you to:

- increase the number of high-quality applicants available
- create a workforce that reflects the diverse range of customers it serves and the community in which it is based
- bring additional skills to the business, such as the ability to use British Sign Language (BSL), which could result in large savings

The costs of making reasonable adjustments to accommodate disabled employees are often low.

Through the all-age Apprenticeship Programme, employers may also be eligible for an additional £2,000 in funding to support apprentices with additional needs.

The benefits of retaining an experienced, skilled employee who has acquired an impairment are usually greater than recruiting and training new staff. It is also good for the individual.

The **Access to Work scheme** can provide help to pay for special equipment, adaptations or support worker services to help disabled people with support costs in the workplace. For more information, visit www.gov.uk/access-to-work

UNDERSTANDING APPRENTICESHIPS IN WALES

Sectors

Employers in almost all sectors of the Welsh economy can participate in apprenticeships and partner with a training provider who will deliver a course suited to your business needs.

Traditionally, you may associate apprenticeships only with sectors such as construction, engineering, or other hands-on jobs, but in recent years this has expanded to a much wider range.

In Wales, an apprentice will follow an approved apprenticeship framework which is available via the [Apprenticeship Framework Library](#).

The frameworks allow for consistency in the types of courses being delivered across the country. As an employer, you'll be partnered with a training provider who will help to deliver the course.

- **Enable cost-effective recruitment and training:** you can cover the apprentice's wage, and the Welsh Government covers most of the training costs.
- **Create a pool of talent:** upskill or recruit apprentices to develop a skilled, qualified workforce.
- **Fill skills gaps:** enabling you to meet demands now and in the future.
- **Help your business grow:** whether you choose to recruit, retrain or redeploy your workforce, apprenticeships can help your business grow.
- **Promote inclusivity:** hiring apprentices allows you to offer opportunities to under-represented groups, promoting inclusivity and bringing a variety of perspectives to your team.

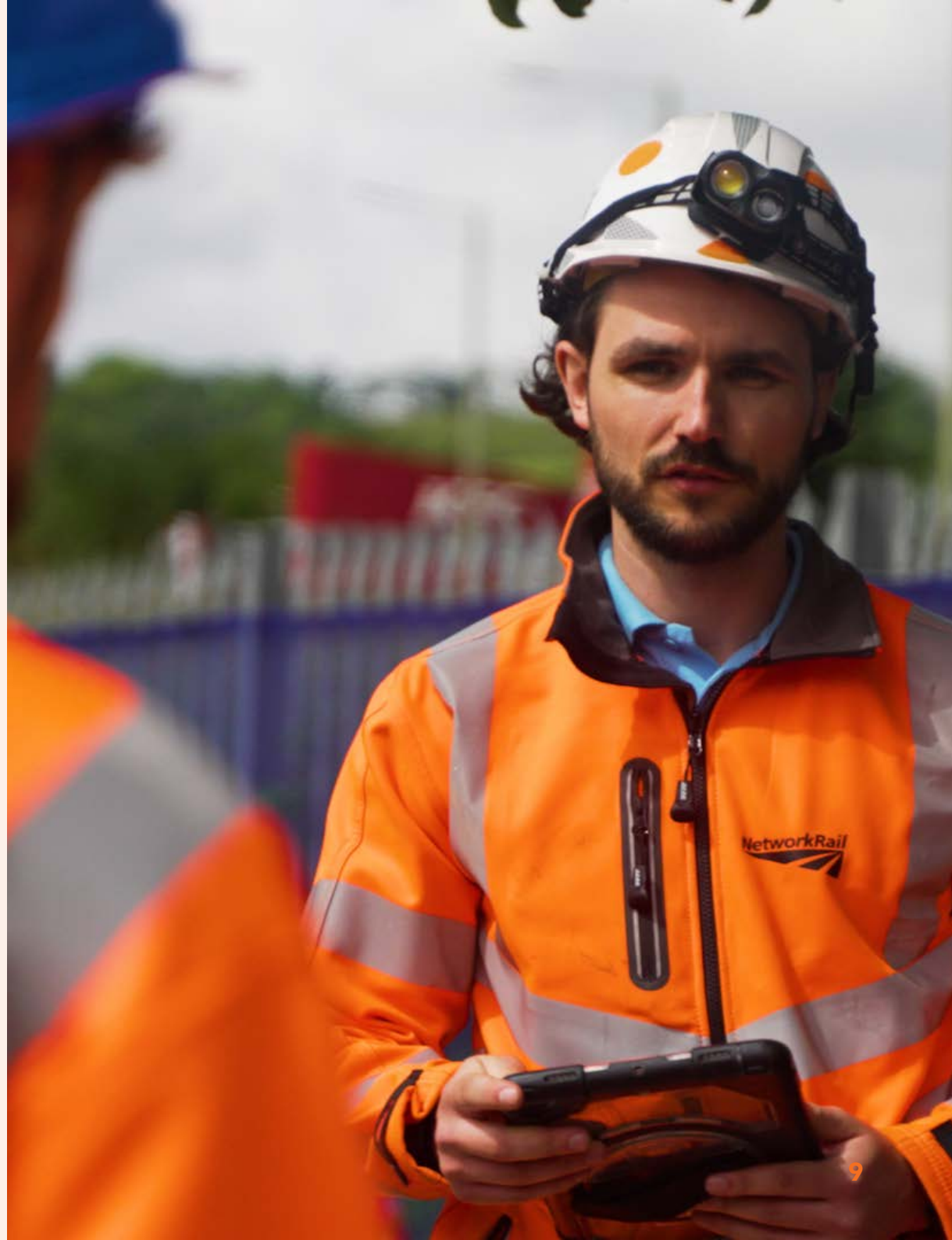


FUNDING AND SUPPORT

Having the right support behind you is key to making your apprenticeship journey a success, and help is at hand for all employers.

- **Expert support:** Once you've registered your interest, you'll be contacted by Business Wales, who will guide you through the process and help you understand what support is available.
- **Recruitment support:** You will work directly with a training provider, who will support you before recruitment even begins. This can include helping you shape the role, understanding what level or framework is most appropriate, and advising on the skills and training your apprentice will receive. They will also help advertise the vacancy on the Apprenticeship Vacancy Service.
- **Training and programme delivery:** A training provider delivers the apprenticeship training and works with you to design a learning plan that fits your business. They carry out regular progress reviews with you and the apprentice.
- **Financial support:** You are responsible for paying the apprentice's wages while they are employed by your organisation. The Welsh Government covers the cost of the training provision.
