## Sowing Seeds for the Future

"Close your eyes, we are in 2035 in Llanidloes. We have successfully transformed our community and our area in many ways, tackling climate change, we are now at a net zero carbon production, we have sustainable local food production, thriving local economy that revive ancient craft and services. We have created a perfect balance with our environment and biodiversity. Human connexion, mutual aid and creativity are at the heart of our society....think about 2035 in Llanidloes for a moment and try to imagine what it feel like, taste, smell, what do you see... Now open your eyes, and share your vision!"

In these times of deep division and deeper despair, if there is a consensus about anything in the world, it is that the future is going to be awful. There is an epidemic of loneliness, an epidemic of anxiety, a mental health crisis of vast proportions, especially among young people. There's a rise in extremist movements and governments. Catastrophic climate change. Biodiversity loss. Food insecurity. The fracturing of ecosystems and communities beyond, it seems, repair. The future—to say nothing of the present—looks grim.

But in the same time, there is plenty of evidence that things can change, and cultures can change, rapidly, dramatically, and unexpectedly—for the better. It happens around the world and even here in Wales, where the community is becoming its own housing developer, energy company, enterprise incubator, and local food network—with cascading benefits to the community that extend far beyond the projects themselves.

Rather than awaiting that politicians, government take engagement and make changing decisions, rather than thinking that at our individual level, we are just a drop in the ocean, We, as a community can make things happens, can start new initiatives, lead the change here and inspire others.

All it takes to start is imagination and creativity. Imagination is *the ability to look at things as if they could be otherwise*. The ability, that is, to ask *What if?* And if there was ever a time when we needed that ability, it is now.

Imagination is central to empathy, to creating better lives, to envisioning and then enacting a positive future. Yet imagination is also demonstrably in decline at precisely the moment when we need it most and we must revive and reclaim it. Once we do, there is no end to what we might accomplish.

On the 5<sup>th</sup> of march, we have hosted a 'Sowing seeds for the future' event, where we looked at what a best-case-scenario would look like in Llanidloes in 15 years. Volunteers from The Hanging Gardens, Zero Carbon Llanidloes, the gardening club and Llani Car Share worked together to contribute to and run the event, which was attended by 107 people.

The objective of this workshop was to create collectively a positive vision of Llanidloes in 2035, sharing ideas, objectives, and ways to achieve them.
